UNO PICKS USA FOR HOME

The United Nations Organization will have its permanent home in the United States, the Site Committee of the UNO preparatory commission has announced. The vote was 30—14 in favor of locating the permanent headquarters in the United States. The commission will chose a city or area within the US for the site of the UNO headquarters. The deciding vote came after the delegates rejected a move to locate the site in Europe, 25 to 23.

PREMIER KONOYE ENDS LIFE

Former Japanese Premier, Prince Fumimaro Konoye, committed suicide Sunday several hours before he was scheduled to surrender as a War Criminal suspect. The three times Premier of Japan killed himself by swallowing poison a his home rather than surrender. Konoye, aged 54, was one of Japan's youngest statesmen and member of the Fujiwara family, second only to the Imperial family. He is supposedly responsible for the Japanese attack on China and for the disastrous war against America. Konoye's suicide note said that he couldn't stand the humiliation of a trial by an American court.

TRUMAN CALLS FOR PEACE IN CHINA

President Truman has set forth the United States policy toward China and has again called for the cessation of hostilities between National and Communist forces and a conference of representatives of the major political elements to bring about the economic recovery of China. Truman said, "China has the clear responsibilty to the other United Nations to eliminate armed conflict within its territory constituting a threat to world stability and peace."

Saying that the United States would continue to assist the National government in the disarmament and evacuation of Japanese troops in the liberated areas. Truman defined the National Government as "the proper instrument to achieve the objective of an unified China," but said the basis of government must be "broadened to include the other political elements in the country." General George C. Marshall, who replaced Maj. Gen. Patrick J. Hurley as special presidential envoy to China, is on his way to Chungking.

FIVE STARS FOR MCNAREY?

Rumors from the British and Russian zone's of Occupation report that General McNarney, US Commander of the European Theatre, will be promoted to a five star general so that he will be on an equal basis with the British and Russian representatives on the Berlin Control Council.

IKE WANTS TO STICK TO JOB

According to the New York Herald Tribune, General Eisenhower who has been unofficially mentioned as a possible Republican Presidential candidate "can be definitely counted out of the list of contenders." General Eisenhower said that the aspires to no political post "whether it is a small town office or the nation's highest job." He added that suggestions that he would enter politics serve no purpose except to embarrass him in his military duties as Chief of Staff.

The Thunderbolts performed well on their recent road trip to pile up three easy wins and to lead the strong 4th Armored Division, reputedly one of the ETO's top fives through most of the clash at Regensburg before bowing out in the final minutes by a 54–48 margin. The Corpsmen on the other hand are somewhat weakened by the loss of Kenneth Menke, former All-America of the Illinois "Whiz Kids" fame. However the Orange and Blue five will be out to avenge their 48–37 loss at Bamberg to the Thunderbolters and will rely on six foot five Paul Horvath and former All Mason-Dixon Conference forward Frances Clark.

The 83rd team will probably start with Lennie Altermann and Jack Feber at forwards, Robert Beck at center, and Morton Nusblatt and Gene Gilliat, at guards.

"BO" MCMILLAN NAMED FOOTBALLER OF YEAR

The man who gave the Indiana Hoosiers their first Big Ten conference title and who produced winning clubs during the four war football years with only civilian players has been named football's "Man of the Year." He is Bo McMillan, who polled 101 out of a possible 142 votes cast by the nation's sports writers.

McMillan was chosen from a list of 23 nominees and bested Doc Blanchard and Col. Earl Blaik of Army and Jimmy Phelan and Herman Wedemeyer of St. Mary's.

CLEVELAND WINS PRO TITLE WITH 16—14 VICTORY

The Cleveland Rams have won their first National Professional Football League title since 1924 by downing the Washington Redskins 16—14, at Cleveland's Municipal Stadium Sunday.

A first quarter safety gained when Sammy Baugh attempted to pass from his own end zone and hit the goal post. The ball bounded out of the end zone for an automatic safety, which was the Rams' margin of victory, The game was played on a frozen field with the temperature down to eight degrees above zero. Two fourth period field goal attemps by the Redskins failed.

The 'Skins regained the lead in the second quarter on a pass to Joe Aguirre good for 38 yards and a touchdown. Then Bobby Waterfield and Jim Benton connected for their 15th touchdown of the season to place the Rams ahead 9—7. The Rams countered again in the third period on a 50 yards aerial from Waterfield to Jim Gillette while the Redskins tallied in the same period when Bob Seymour caught a touchdown pass.

CARLAN KIDNAPPING MYSTERY SOLVED

The "kidnapped" six month old baby, Roland Carlan, was discovered murdered Sunday in his Chelsea, Mass., home in a closest. His mother, 23 year old Rose Carlan, is being held in a physchopathic ward for murder. Reportedly taken from his baby carriage by and elderly woman three weeks ago, Roland has been the subject of a two week old search conducted by his frantic father, sailor James J. Carlan, who had never seen the child.

DEMAND MORE FOOD FOR GERMANY

Thirty-four Senators have signed a petition to President Truman to releive the "appaling famine in Germany and Austria." The petition recommended: "one, to give orders at once our Armed Forces to raise the food rations above the present starvation level in the US zone of Occupation and restore immediately the mail and postage service: two, start negotiations at once with the Russian state with the object of gaining his permission to send American food supplies into the Russian zone of Occupation in order to diminish the appaling daily death rate: three, to give permission now to private relief organizations to start operations in Germany and Austria to support the efforts of our occupation forces; and four: to authorize and create an independent American relief mission to avert this impending disaster of wholesale starvation and pestilence now threatening Europe, even beyond the assistance now being furnished by UNRRA."

TABRIZ GARRISON SURROUNDED

The governor of the north Persian province of Azerbaijan arrived in Teheran from Tabriz, capital of Azerbaijan yesterday. He exported the garrison at Tabriz was completely surrounded and asked for instructions. Refugees arriving in Teheran from Azerbaijan reported the democratic party was preventing supplies from reaching the garrison of Tabriz.
